Tips for Sharing Up, Down, and Around With a Group

- Hold the book to one side of your body so the children can always see the pages as you read.
- Before you read:
 - * Share the title and author's and illustrator's names with the children.
 - * Ask some questions to get the children thinking. Here are some suggestions:
 - v What things do you know that go Up? What things go Down? What things go Around?
 - v Do you have a garden at home?
 - v If not, do you know anyone with a garden?
 - v What do you/they grow in your/their garden?
 - v What would you grow if you had your very own garden?
- As you read:
 - * Because the story is in rhyme you may want to read the story through one time. Then go back and spend time on each double page spread.
 - * Have the children "read" along by identifying the vegetables in each picture where they can.
 - * On every other double page "around and around" ends the text. Have the children chime in with those words, especially on repeat readings.
 - * On the last pages the book characters enjoy lunch. Spend some time identifying all the different ingredients.
- After the story:
 - * This is a great time for some opinion questions, such as:
 - v What would you eat from the picnic on the last page?
 - v What dishes would you cook with these vegetables?
 - v What is your favorite vegetable/fruit?

You might want to end by telling the children you know a song about making a garden. Sing **This is the Way** and then have them join in the motions.
